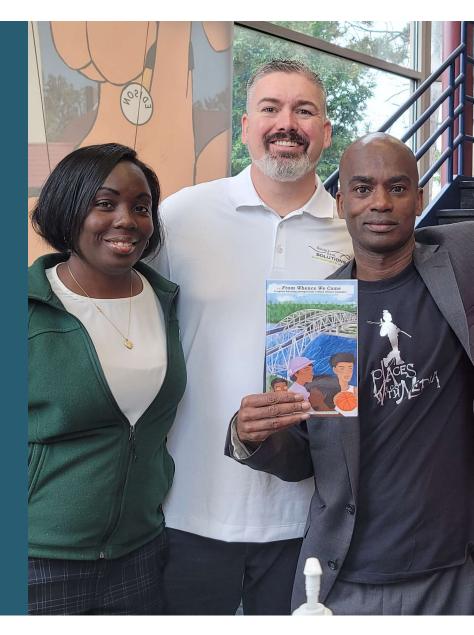


Introductions

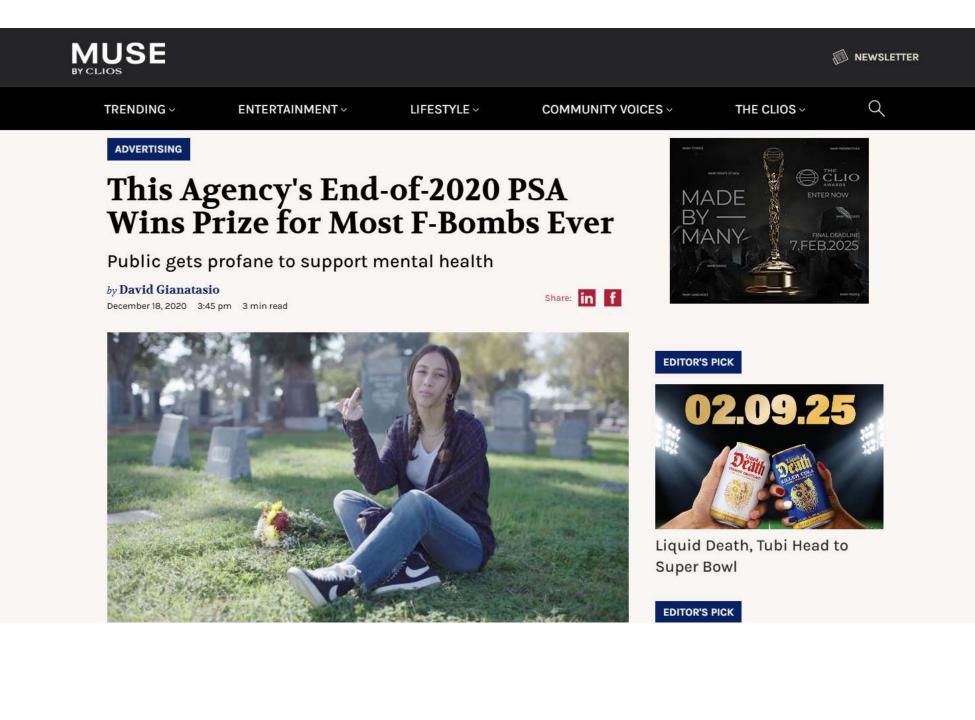


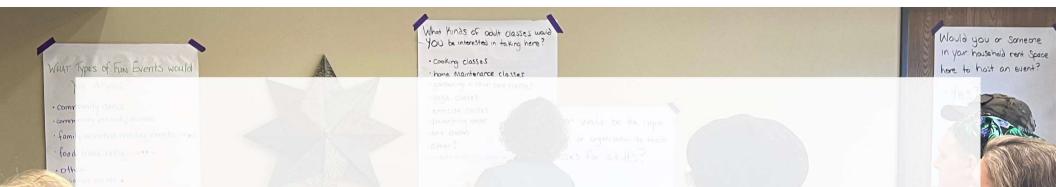
